



Some Important Initiatives

1. Small Grant

The Poland Embassy provided a grant of Rupees Four Lacs to the Trust. The grant was used to implement the educational program and the vocational training program of the Trust. The educational program of the Trust provided Non Formal and Remedial Education to 438 children from the marginalized section of the society. Its NFE & REC centers were run at three locations in the vicinity of Prem Nagar Colony,

Under the vocational training program, the grant was utilized to impart vocational training to **148** adolescent girls and women through sewing centers at three locations namely, Shani Bazaar, Dharam Enclave and Indira Enclave in Prem Nagar Colony.

2. Ambassador's Grant

The Irish Embassy granted a financial assistance of Rupees Two Lacs Ten Thousand to Oasis Charitable Trust to carry out its development initiatives in a more effective manner. The grant was utilized to bring more quality to the ongoing programs of the Trust. The grant was specifically utilized for the following.

1) Nutrition Supply at the Education Centers

Supplementary nutrition was provided regularly to the children of the education centers as the children were deprived of nutritional diet in their households and due to lack of that they were prone to many diseases and infections. Nutritional diet like milk, egg etc. were provided once in a week to all the children attended the non formal and remedial education centers. Around **438** Children benefited by this program.

2) Purchase of Computer for the Trust

Proper documentation is a prerequisite for a program that has large financial aspects and involvement. Since the OCT SHG - Micro Finance program deals with around Two Million Rupees, it is imperative to keep transparency and accountability at every level. In order to run the program in a qualitative manner, a computer and its accessories were purchased for the Trust with the grant of the Irish Embassy.

EDUCATION

Education initiatives of OCT incepted in Prem Nagar Colony in Delhi in the year 2006 for the children from vulnerable circumstances have started to produce measurable impacts. Quality and efficacy of the project intervention has been improving with active support from the target groups. Parents of the children are taking larger interests in the development of their wards.

Major Achievements

a. Identification, Coaching & Mainstreaming

During the reporting year, **438** children were admitted to Non Formal/Remedial Education Centers functioning in 3 areas. They received education provided in a joyful and innovative manner. A total of **95** non-school going children from the NFE centers were mainstreamed into classes 1 to 5 in nearby Government Schools.

b. Latent Talent Development Activities

All the **438** children of the NFE& REC centers were benefited by activities like drawing competitions, sports competitions, dance, music and drama performances organized to mark the celebration of festivals and days of national Importance.

c. Life Skill Training

Life skill training was regularly provided by the teachers in the classes and it benefited all the children.

d. Study Tour

One study trip was organized for the children to the historically important locations in Delhi. **120** children from the project attended the study tour.

e. Celebrations

Major festivals like Diwali, Holi, X'mas and important days like Children's day, New Year, Republic day were celebrated among the children with great fanfare. Different activities were conducted in the education centers to make children aware about the significance of each day.

f. Strengthening Civil Society

5 PTA meetings were held and a total of **168** parents attended these meetings. The teachers conducted regular home visits to sensitize the families of the children on different issues.

g. Provision of Nutritional Diet to Children

Nutrition deficiency has been identified as a major health problem among the children of this area. So once in a week, nutritional diet like egg, milk etc were provided to the children of the education centers.

COMMUNITY HEALTH

Under its Community Health program, OCT tries to build a conductive environment for the healthy living of the target people through its **Preventive and Promotive Health Care Activities**. It tried to create a health seeking behavior among the target groups. Alongside improving their capacities to prevent diseases, the project also focused to change many attitudes and behaviors prevalent in the community that facilitated many diseases. For promoting health care among the children and their family members, health talks, workshops and meetings were conducted by the health team of the project on a regular basis.

Major Achievements

A. Community Meetings

Behavior change communication is the core factor in any health intervention programme which can ensure the sustainability of the programme. So health awareness and health communication are prominent parts of OCT's health programmes.

An AIDS awareness programme was conducted at Shani Bazaar Colony to sensitize the community people of this location on this important health issue. Around **78** people attended this program where the staff of another NGO working specifically on HIV/AIDS, participated as resource persons.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING

The Vocational Training Program of the Trust gives due emphasis to capacity building and empowerment of its women beneficiaries. Apart from imparting skill training on Sewing and Dress Making, the centre also tries to enable all round development of the trainees through personality development trainings provided on a regular basis.

A. Examination & Certification

Certificates were provided to the trainees who have successfully completed the course for a minimum period of one year after clearing the examination conducted at the end. During the reporting period, **67** trainees passed the examination and were awarded with merit certificates.

B. Exposure Trip

A one day exposure trip was organized for the trainees of the sewing centers on 14.11.2011. 86 trainees from the 3 sewing centers of the participated in the trip and enjoyed visiting important places of Delhi like India Gate, Qutub Minar, Red Fort, Lotus Temple etc.

C. Provision of Sewing Machines to the Needy

In order to make its commitment for self reliance of women a reality, the Trust provides sewing machines to the needy girls and women to begin their self entrepreneurial programs. During the course of the training, the trainees save a certain amount of money with the project and at the end, the Trust provides matching grant to purchase machines. During the year **18** sewing machines were provided through the scheme.




Sewing Trainees visiting Nehru Planetarium

SHG & MICRO FINANCE

Empowering women through knowledge and capacity building has been a forte of OCT for long. Self reliant SHGS of women were formulated and facilitated by the Trust. Women were provided with continuous training on the management of their SHGs. Micro credit and micro enterprises were promoted and within a short span of time, significant results were produced by the Trust through this intervention. Many families were enabled towards self reliance by way micro finance and micro enterprises. Apart from this, awareness programmes were conducted in all the locations on different issues relevant in the lives of the women.
