- To provide training, sensitization and counselling to Prisoners of War, War Victims, prisoners, prostitutes, street kids, bar attendants, youth and other marginalised groups.
- Act as attitude and behaviour change agents in the country and in East African as a whole.
- Provision of survival skills entrepreneurship to the youth, women and all such needy groups including the unemployed.
- Assist people in the community to access quality health care, understand issues of family planning, proper hygiene, sanitation, ante-natal, immunization and medical care

#### 2.1 The new management structure.

The Allied Initiatives for Community Development is headed by the General assembly that appoints the board of directors which runs the daily activities of the organisation.

The general assembly has membership of over 1,200 members from whom members of the board of directors are elected by the general assembly.

#### 2.2 The new management policies

The board of directors passed a set of new management policies that are aimed at streamlining the leadership and management of the organisation. Notably to this were the new finance policy and the new human resource policy.

AFICOD is committed to responsible financial management. The entire organization including the board of directors, administrators, and staff will work together to make certain that all financial matters of the organization are addressed with care, integrity, and in the best interest AFICOD.

The policy and procedural guidelines contained in the drafted policy are designed to:

- Protect the assets of AFICOD
- Ensure the maintenance of accurate records of AFICOD's financial activities;
- Provide a framework of operating standards and behavioral expectations; and,


#### The new finance policy

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF ALLIED INITIATIVES FOR COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT (AFICOD)
Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of **Allied Initiatives for Community Development** as set out on pages 6 to 19. The financial statements comprise the Statement of Financial Position at **30 June 2010**, the Statement of Comprehensive Income, and Statement of Cash Flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes.

### Director's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Directors are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the various donor reporting requirements and the organization's accounting policies. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

#### **Auditor's Responsibility**

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error.

In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates

made by Management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the

financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

# HEALTH AND HIV/AIDS

We approach this thematic area using two components

# Maternal Health and Safe Motherhood Promotion Program

Program Goal: To contribute towards the reduction of maternal and child morbidity and mortality in Uganda.

# Components:


### A. Community Birth Preparedness Promotion

#### **Key Focus:**

- 1. To empower communities to stay healthy, make healthy decisions and deliver under skilled attendance by responding to Obstetric Emergencies and increasing demand for maternal and child survival services.
- 2. To promote Free Antenatal Care approach to expectant mothers directed towards making pregnancy and labour a safe and satisfying experience.
- 3. To strengthen capacity and linkages for social support between Individuals, Families and Communities and with the health delivery system structures for maternal and Child Survival promotion so that no child or mother dies.

# **Approaches and Achievements**

Sensitization and awareness-raising



### **Training**

Health personnel was continuously trained in antenatal counselling with particular attention to mother-to-child transmission of HIV, in performing HIV rapid tests and in postnatal counselling comprising infant nutrition, growth monitoring, STD management and family planning.

# B. Sexual and Reproductive Health Service Promotion Key Focus:

- **4.** To promote community based Family Planning and Reproductive Health Services among people in the reproductive age in the AFICOD focus districts.
- **5.** To strengthen Youth Friendly Sexual Reproductive Health Services in the Community Health Care systems as a strategy for maternal health promotion.

# C. Obstetric Fistula Prevention and Management-OFPM Key Focus:

- **6.** To enhance community awareness on obstetric fistula causes, treatment, mitigation and prevention in AFICOD focus districts in Uganda.
- **7.** To increase access to treatment and other fistula repair health services for women with fistula in AFICOD focus districts in Uganda.

**8.** To support social- reintegration of obstetric fistula women survivors through psychosocial counselling, support and economic empowerment.

# D. Quality healthcare provision

Significant accomplishments in the Prevention, Care and Treatment Programme over the past year have included:

- The establishment of a transition clinic for young adults who are living with HIV; this clinic serves as a bridging service for those between pediatric and adult care, and is one of a kind in the country.
- A special clinic is now run to support HIV discordant couples and those that are on HAART
- Reliable referral collaboration with Baylor College of medicines' pediatric centre.
- Family planning services are now fully integrated into all care at the community health clinic.
- A sustainable mobile clinic programme that provides mobile healthcare to remote villages in the hilly Rwenzori region.

In Uganda women, infants and young children account for more than 60% of all new HIV infections (MoH 2010). An estimated 110,000 children in Uganda are living with HIV, almost all (90 percent) a result of mother-to-child




the least healthcare coverage because the region is too hilly and therefore hard to reach. Progress in scaling up effective and comprehensive services for the prevention of mother-to-child transmission of HIV (PMTCT) has been slow in this region, people here hardly benefit from the national referral system, the village healthcare teams are nonexistent, and 70% mothers deliver in their homes under the care of traditional birth attendants who do not have adequate knowledge and skills in PMTCT interventions.

In 2010 AFICOD increased its home care based services by increasing the number of HIV orphans receiving social care, increasing the number of homecare visits to pregnant mothers as shown in the chart bellow





Child health care programs like immunizations were a very routine activity last year. Rotavirus vaccination is not yet on Uganda's child health program, despite its proven effectiveness in preventing diarrheal diseases that claim lives of over 200,000 Ugandan children every year.

# **EDUCATION**

In 2010 we made major steps in supporting childhood education program During 2010 this program supported 51 children with shelter, clothing, medical services, food, scholastic materials, personal requirements and visiting them in schools.

# Programme Goal and Objectives Goal

To enable vulnerable children build a strong foundation for their future through education.

# **Objectives**

- To support vulnerable children to access formal education primary, secondary and tertiary.
- To support children to access basic needs namely health care, clothing, food and shelter.

• To provide children with psychosocial and counseling services.

## **Major activities**

- Providing tuition for the OVCs to enable them access formal education right from primary up to university
- Provide shelter i.e. housing for the children who have no known relatives or guardians.
- Providing feeding, clothing, health care and scholastic and school requirements.
- Emphasis under this program is put on elderly grandmothers caring for HIV/AIDS orphans



- Meet their healthy needs including supporting children who are HIV+ to access ARVs, counseling and testing and treatment in life skills decision making, managing relations, choosing career development and leadership s kills.
- Conducting health education including sensitizing children on HIV and AIDS and other sexually related diseases and the importance of personal hygiene.
- Visiting the children in schools and organizing meetings for relatives of such children.
- Participating in district meetings organized for NGOs implementing child related programmes.
